The Dickson Library was designed by an architect named **Dr. Enrico Taglietti**, who was born in Italy. The building is special and protected because of its unique design. It has flat, wide roofs and interesting pointy shapes that make it look different from most other buildings.

The library is designed in what's called an **organic style**. This means the building is made to fit in with the nature around it. Instead of looking like a plain box, it uses smooth lines, natural shapes, and angles so it feels like it belongs in its environment—almost like part of the landscape.
